


It is a library—a collection of sacred writings recognized by the people of God down through history.

- Why did God give these writings to us?




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My View:


At its most basic level, the Bible is a book about God and his ways.

But God's image bearers rebel against their maker. Now what?




We are presented in Scripture with an overarching story of:

- Restoration


And it begins with what we call the Old (or First) Testament.








- 1. The Bible is God's communication of himself and his will to us.

Why Do We Have to Interpret the Bible?




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
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The process of interpreting and applying the Bible may be compared to taking a *journey*.

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3. Crossing the Principlizing Bridge

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


Arrangement of the English and Hebrew Bibles


