




Thorny Questions Abound in this Passage

- ✓ What kind of a God would ever command that such a sacrifice be made?







The Costly Sacrifice of the FATHER


- "Take your son, your only son, Isaac, whom you love, and... sacrifice him...as a burnt offering."

 - It's significant that God doesn't tell Abraham to murder his son.








The Costly Sacrifice of the FATHER

- Because it's <u>Isaac</u> who can't be bought back, this story is about something much more frightening than child sacrifice. <u>Is God a liar?</u>












The Gracious Provision of the LORD The promise-child of God is spared. (11-12a) The purpose of God is served. (12b) The provision of God is discovered. (13-14)

What Drove Abraham Up That Mountain? Temple is where God begins to resolve the great dilemma: How can a just God be gracious? How can a gracious God be just?

- Temple is where God begins to resolve the great dilemma:
